A Rationale for Summer Reading

- To improve reading fluency
- To generate interest and pleasure in reading that enriches the educational experience
- To use time not available during the school year to read classics that expand cultural literacy
- To prepare for thoughtful discussion and writing beginning the first day of class
- To encourage a lifelong love of reading

• The Hiding Place

Corrie Ten Boom

This riveting story tells how a middle-aged Dutch watchmaker became a heroine of the Resistance, a survivor of Hitler's death camps, and one of the most remarkable evangelists of the twentieth century.

Choice Texts (Honors - select two, Standard - select one)

• Ender's Game

Orson Scott Card

Andrew "Ender" Wiggin, a six-year-old boy genius, is selected by the world governments to train, along with other exceptional children, to fight against the greatest threat the Earth has ever known.

• The Giver

Lois Lowry

A young boy named Jonas grows up in a seemingly perfect world, one free of hunger, pain, and sadness. But at what cost? Follow Jonas as he uncovers the truth behind the seeming utopia that he lives in.

• Little Women

Louisa May Alcott

Meg – the sweet tempered one. Jo - the smart one. Beth – the shy one. Amy – the sassy one. Together they are the March sisters. Their father is away at war and times are difficult, but the bond between the sisters is strong. Through sisterly squabbles, happy times and sad, their four lives follow different paths, and discover that growing up is sometimes very hard to do...

• Between Shades of Gray

Ruta Sepetys

Fifteen-year-old Lina is a Lithuanian girl living an ordinary life – until Soviet officers invade her home and tear her family apart. Separated from her father and forced onto a crowded train, Lina, her mother, and her young brother make their way to a Siberian work camp, where they are forced to fight for their lives. Lina finds solace in her art, documenting these events by drawing.

Risking everything, she imbeds clues in her drawings of their location and secretly passes them along, hoping her drawings will make their way to her father's prison camp. But will strength, love, and hope be enough for Lina and her family to survive?

- And Then There Were None Agatha Christie

 10 strangers are invited to a remote island by a secretive millionaire in this classic murder mystery. Each stranger becomes a victim, one by one, and no one is above suspicion.
- *The Chosen* Chaim Potok
 A moving story set in Brooklyn, New York, in the 1940s about an unlikely friendship between two Jewish boys that begins with a simple baseball game.
- The Lord of the Rings (any book in trilogy) J.R.R. Tolkien
 The Lord of the Rings trilogy tells of the great quest of Frodo Baggins (nephew of Bilbo) and the rest of the fellowship of the Ring. Students can read any book in the trilogy if they have previously read one in the series; however, if someone has read only *The Hobbit*, he/she should read *The Fellowship of the Ring*.

General Instructions/Evaluations

- 1. *The Hiding Place* is the starting point for eighth grade literature-it is the required reading for both Standard and Honors sections.
- 2. Students will be grouped by the choice book(s) that they have read. The specific evaluation method(s) will be discussed the first day of class.
- 3. Students should have all summer reading books the first day of class.
- 4. Although not required for summer reading, annotation (highlighting, margin notes, summaries)
- 5. You are permitted to read along with an audiobook if that is
